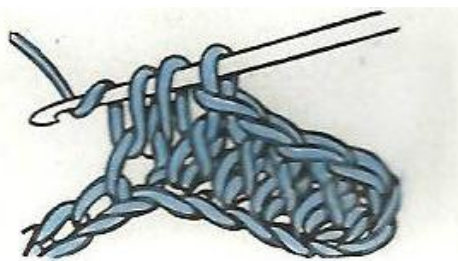
TODDLERS AND CHILDREN:

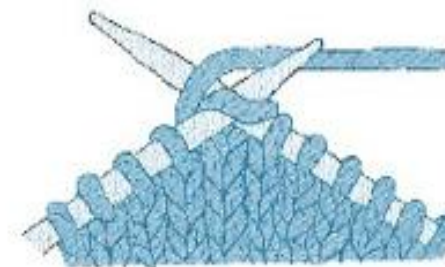

Who We Are

The **Needlework Guild** began in Dorset, England in 1882 in response to the needs of children orphaned by mining disasters in Wales. The Guild expanded throughout Britain, and eventually to Canada and the United States. In Britain the name finally became the Queen Mother's Clothing Guild, but the original name has been retained in Canada.

The Toronto Branch has been providing new articles to immigrants and low-income Torontonians, through front line social service agencies **since 1892**. Our financial base is derived solely through monetary donations given by our 300 active members, corporations, service clubs, foundations, bequests and memorials. We are a **registered Canadian Charity** and tax receipts are issued for donations of at least \$10.

Members agree to donate at least 2 new items each year and/or make a financial donation, to enable our Purchasing Co-ordinator to purchase additional items.

Members are organized into groups under a Convenor who oversees the collection of financial donations, and handmade or purchased articles for Distribution Day, and is the link to the NGC Executive.

New members may join as a group or as an individual, who will then be assigned to an existing group. Some groups meet to socialize, some to knit together, and some members prefer to work on their own.

Our work is accomplished entirely by volunteers. We have no fixed address, but are generously provided space for our Annual General Meeting and other NGC events at Yorkminster Park Baptist Church. Sincere thanks to the Dorcas Group, our oldest unit, formed in 1927, for their gracious hospitality. Members volunteer to assist in sorting and packing donations for our annual Distribution Day in November when we apportion items to the various agencies we support.
